### **COVID-19 HEALTH RESPONSE**

**Purpose:** to share with Timor-Leste government what development partners have committed for:

- delivery of the government's vaccine plan
- ongoing COVID-19 health response efforts
- reaffirm development partners' support for Timor-Leste country leadership

## VACCINES (Pillar 10)

Development partners have made significant contributions to **COVAX** and the **COVAX Advanced Market Commitment** to ensure Timor-Leste receives doses for up to 20% of its total population

- <u>COVAX AMC</u> includes commitments from EU, USA, Japan, Australian, New Zealand and Korea
- · First batch of AstraZeneca doses will start arriving from March, with allocations to be confirmed by GAVI on 22 February
- Council of Ministers endorsed WHO-approved AstraZeneca vaccine on Monday

Development partners will support Timor-Leste's rollout of the COVAX supplied vaccines

- WHO and UNICEF are leading support to MOH with own resources (funding from member countries) and additional funding from Australia, EU, GAVI and others
- Includes the development and implementation of the National Vaccine Deployment Plan (NVDP)

#### Achieving full vaccine coverage

- Australia has committed USD18.8 million for technical assistance, procurement of doses for 80% of the population, and delivery of vaccine campaigns
- Japan has expressed interest in providing vaccines in the future
- ADB has advised MOF that it established an approved COVID-19 vaccination support facility
